2023-2024 PROFESSOR OF THE YEAR

Dr. Sarah Parker is a Professor of English and currently serves as both the Director of JU's Center for Gender + Sexuality and as chair of the Literature, Language, and Culture Department. She is a passionate educator and especially enjoys directing undergraduate research projects in literary studies, women's and gender studies, and medical humanities. She is the faculty advisor to the Gender and Sexuality Alliance (GSA) student group and an outspoken ally for the LGBTQ+ community at JU. Her interdisciplinary research agenda focuses primarily on the intersections of literature and the history of medicine. She is also an active volunteer with Mayo Clinic Florida's new archive. She lives at the beach with her husband, Dr. Joe Cradlebaugh, and her cat Ziggy.

Dr. Buffy Maetozo began her professional life in New England, mostly Massachusetts, where she earned an undergrad degree at Springfield College and master's degree at Northeastern University. Then, making her way down the east coast studying and teaching exercise and fitness in some capacity in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Georgia, and finally to Florida State University, she completed her Ph.D. She joined JU in 1999 where she has taught a variety of classes as there were, at that time, only two faculty members in the Physical Education department. She eventually transitioned to Exercise Science where her teaching focused on Exercise Science courses only (fitness, wellness, activity courses). At this time in her 25th year at JU, she is part-time teaching group exercise and personal training courses which are her passion. During her career she was awarded certifications from the American College of Sports Medicine in many areas.

Dr. Emily S. Pugh graduated with an occupational therapy bachelor's degree in 1985 followed by a master's in counseling psychology and a doctorate focused on student mental health. Initially serving as a hospital rehabilitation and mental health OT, she moved into hospital management and administration at Florida Hospital in Orlando and later at UF Health. After adjunct teaching, she accepted a faculty position at the University of Florida, where she taught for 17 years. Throughout her career she has served in multiple professional leadership positions and was awarded Fellow in the American Occupational Therapy Association for her "Exemplary Leadership, Education, and Facilitation of Client Safety." If asked why she came to JU, she explains it was JU's culture with the opportunity to know each student so that she could support them throughout their journey to a doctorate of OT. Dr. Steven Davis is a lifetime educator; serving 25 years at Jacksonville University and formerly as a 3rd and 5th grade classroom teacher in Jacksonville. He specializes in working with prospective teachers in the areas of curriculum and instruction, in addition to internship supervision, classroom management, research methodology, and working with diverse learners. University Service has been a major focus for Dr. Davis, especially working with individuals and groups who share a common focus on improving K-12 and higher education. Dr. Davis has a lengthy history of working with JU students in extracurricular activities, especially water sports, and being a faculty advisor for student clubs. When not teaching, most of his time these days is spent as a husband and father of two young children.

Professor Taralyn Parker Fender graduated from The College of Charleston in Charleston, SC in May 1993 with her Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics. In August 1993, she started her teaching career teaching mathematics at the high school level. She has taught all levels of mathematics in high schools in South Carolina, (her home state), Texas, and here in Jacksonville, Fl. While in Texas, she also taught introductory mathematics courses at Central Texas College and that is where she began taking courses toward her master's degree in mathematics. Upon moving to Jacksonville, the yearning to receive her master's degree in mathematics grew stronger and she became a graduate student at Jacksonville University. She graduated with her Master of Arts degree in Mathematics in May 2010 at which time the department chair, Pam Crawford, offered her a position as an adjunct professor. In December 2016, she received her master's in business administration degree in Accounting and Finance where she was one of the Top 40 Talents highlighted in the Advantage Business Magazine. Given that degree, she has been the lead professor for the Business Calculus class which is a requirement for all business majors. She has been a member of various organizations since 2012 Pi Mu Epsilon, Mathematics society, Mathematics Association of America, Beta Sigma Gamma, Academy of International Business and Phi Kappa Phi. Her plans after retirement are to travel and enjoy life with her husband of 48 years, Paul, and her family.

Dr. Daniel McCarthy has served JU as a Professor of Biology and Marine Science for 20 years. He has taught marine-related undergraduate and graduate courses supervising numerous student theses and independent studies. His focus has been on providing students immersive field experiences in ecosystems including those in Jacksonville, the Keys, Bahamas, and Italy. He and his students have studied ecological interactions on coral, nearshore, and oyster reefs including techniques to enhance artificial reefs well as nursery-reared coral survival. He has published numerous peer-reviewed articles and technical reports including a book on east Florida coast reefs. His research has been funded by the Nature Conservancy, Protect the Reef, Sea Grant, DEP, and City of Jacksonville. He has served as a reviewer for the NSF and National Geographic, and several peerreviewed journals. He has been awarded JU's Excellence in Scholarly Activities, and Institutional Excellence Awards. Professor McCarthy currently lives on the Ortega River on his sailboat with his wife and three daughters.



Dr. Mike Nancarrow, Professor of Mathematics, has been at JU since August 1998 following his retirement from the United States Navy. While in the Navy he developed a passion for education while working as an P3 Orion aircraft flight, classroom, and simulator instructor. From 2004 to 2016 he served as JU Institutional Review Board Chair and Administrator. Dr. Nancarrow also served on various University committees including Curriculum, Appointments, and Academic Freedom and Grievance. He and a small group of students founded the Outing Club in 2014. Dr. A. Quinton White, Jr began his career at JU in 1976 as a Visiting Assistant Professor and then went on to start the marine science program (1978), serving as Department Chair, Division Chair, Dean of Arts and Sciences, and retires as Executive Director, Marine Science Research Institute (MSRI) and Professor of Biology and Marine Science. He was Professor the Year in 1987-88. He has traveled extensively taking students, literally, across the globe. In 1997-98, he was an American Council of Education Fellow at Elon University. Dr. White has authored numerous research/technical papers or reports and has received grants and contracts. His research focused on the history of human impact on the St. Johns River, manatees, and water quality issues. He served as a consultant to the City of Jacksonville's Waterways Commission for over 30 years. The MSRI opened in 2010 and is the first and only LEED certified gold building on campus. Dr. White has been active in the Jacksonville community and received several awards for his service. He was President of Leadership Jacksonville (1992-93), the Museum of Science and History (1996-97), and the Jacksonville Community Council, Inc. (2008-09). He was the Biologist for the Greater Jacksonville Kingfish Tournament for 30 years. He was a founding member of the St. Johns Riverkeeper. Dr. White writes a monthly column in the Florida Times-Union called "River Life," about river-related issues which he hopes to turn into a book. He has been active with OCEARCH at JU, working to establish their headquarters at Mayport, Florida. Not bad for a guy who thought he would be at JU for 2 years.



Dr. Colleen Wilson has been a member of the JU Dolphin Family for 25 years. Having the opportunity to work with undergraduate students passionate about education has been her idea of a professional dream come true. Designing classes that create school-based learning linked with academics has added strength and rigor to JU student experiences, and thousands of volunteer hours provided in Arlington schools. Dr. Courtney Barclay is a Professor of Law and Communication. She has taught courses in public relations, DEI, and media law. An expert in First Amendment law, Dr. Barclay's research analyzes speech and privacy implications of emerging uses and regulation of technology, particularly as it impacts commercial speech. Her work has been published in law reviews and conference proceedings, and is featured in two textbooks. Dr. Barclay serves on and leads committees for the college, university, and professional and academic associations. Before joining JU, Dr. Barclay taught graduate and undergraduate courses at the S.I. Newhouse School at Syracuse University and served as Visiting Scholar at the Electronic Privacy Information Center. She holds a Ph.D. in Mass Communication and a J.D. from the University of Florida. If she's not in her office, you might find her on the golf course with her husband David or cuddling up with her dog Minnie.

Dr. Cheryl Bergman, Professor of Nursing, started her employment at Jacksonville University in 1995 as an adjunct clinical nursing faculty. She discovered that she enjoyed teaching and was hired in 2001 as a full-time nursing faculty, she has been at Jacksonville University for a total of 28 1/2 years.
